
Experiencing this ecological wonderland up close can awaken a sense of adventure and fascination with nature that can help shape our children's and our own approach to nature and conservancy.





The Elk River Water Trail begins at the tailwaters of the Sutton Dam (I-79 Exit 62) and continues through three counties: Braxton, Clay and Kanawha.

The Water Trail has 14 Primary Access Locations and 2 Proposed Sites which are conveniently located close to Interstate 79 exits 1 through 62. All Primary Sites are marked with road signs and some have Elk River Water Trail signage and/or information kiosks. These sites are marked with an asterisk.
